NESOP Occupation Marches Forward With New MOS ID - Should The Newsletter?

As most should have heard by now, all occupations in the CF have been assigned new MOS ID codes. Our occupation, formally known as NESOP 276, is now officially NESOP 00115. Unlike way back in the days of MORPS (find the oldest NESOP you can for explanation of what MORPS was) when two trades became one and were assigned a new Military Occupation Code (MOC) number for identification purposes, this change is driven by other factors that have nothing to do with a change in our occupation. Still, like the days of MORPS, it will take a while for all of us to stop using "276" and think of ourselves as 00115er's. 00115 just does not have the same ring to it. For those who have been around long enough, it's been twenty years we've been saying "276". For other occupations this is just a matter of adjustment. For the occupation that sets the standard it's a much bigger issue. I'm referring to our Newsletter. Entitled the "NESOP Newsletter" and existing for seven plus years, it's been read religiously by hundreds of 276 NESOPs. Note

the "276" is front and center on the title page. Are we now to change the title page to read "00115"? Does it make any difference to you – a NESOP? Is there a historical precedent here? Should this publication become the "NESOP 00115 Newsletter" based on administrative issues or should we hold true to our origin? Is it more important to continue recognizing our roots or better to move with the tide? I have to dig deep in my "I love ME" chest to find things labelled with "FC 071" and it took a while to develop the "276 to the end" attitude. Do I have to now put away all my "276" items and change yet once again? Like I asked earlier – does it really make any difference? Prior to the next issue I would like you all to tell me if it makes a difference to you, the NESOP 276ers, via email "Letters to the Editor". I will include as many submissions as possible in the next edition.

Occupation Manager Notes

My last article in issue 16 dealt primarily with the new TOS. Yes, there was a lot of info given the complexity of the merging policies. In this issue, I'll provide an update regarding IPS take-up rates, and other issues, prior to removing my butt from this particular seat and heading east.

TOS Take-Up Rates

A contentious issue.

For a few years now, we have had various IPS take-up rates (rank-dependant). The methodology used to determine the percentage of members that would be offered further TOS was primarily focused on the health of the Occupation at various points in time.

Although it had excellent intentions, that methodology was not necessarily meeting the objective of keeping an occupation healthy, particularly given our slightly higher than average attrition rate. In many instances, we were creating points when people would be forced to leave, even though they were functioning fully in the occupation, at their **current** rank (which is what TOS is based on > NOT potential higher ranks).

I could easily fill three pages here with the pros and cons of changing our take-up rates, that will even allow LS the opportunity to be offered and accept IPS. Trust that for the occupation, when all is considered, this is a positive move.

The upcoming TOS boards (fall05), have been provided with the following IPS take-up rates ... drumroll ... 100% LS and above.

Further, a letter has been forwarded to DMCARM (NDHQ TOS Authority) requesting that the same take-up rate be backdated to reflect previous boards, to which current members on CE's were looked at. In short...if you are on a CE, and are NOT career restricted to current TOS, you will be offered IPS.

The biggest concern seems to be the effect on promotions. After meticulously reviewing previous years' data, I can attest that this will have a minimal impact on progression within the occupation. The vast majority of promotions occur as a result of unscheduled attrition. That will continue regardless.

The benefit will be retaining qualified members, who may not have been offered further TOS for no reason other than the year they were looked at against a certain percentage rate.

Security Clearances

I though this would have been behind us by now.

In checking the NESOP database 2 minutes ago, fully 56 of 351 qualified NESOPs do not possess a level 3 (TS) security clearance. In some cases, this may be due to HRMS input errors. Recent experience in checking some of these supports the less optimistic reason; that being that the members simply don't possess Top Secret.

If you're in the process of updating/upgrading, check the status. Simply put, if you don't possess the requisite security clearance, your employment is restricted. I'll be passing a list of members not possessing a Lvl 3 to the coastal Occ Advisors today for verification.

So Where's The Occupation Headed?

There are multiple, and I do mean multiple, initiatives taking place right now that will reshape the Navy of tomorrow. I fully expect that we'll be transforming, in one way or another, with it. Whether we tackle the changes with our usual zeal, or not, is totally up to us. One thing however is certain. If we sit on the sidelines, we won't have the necessary input to place us where we belong. It's not the senior folk that will ultimately be affected; it's the OS-CPO1's 5-20 years from

now. It is however up to all of us now to take an active approach and ensure the occupation is well situated. If you get the opportunity, even if at an Advisory Group meeting to listen/comment on the issues, do so. We'll all benefit in the end.

Time To Depart

After six full and very eventful years in NDHQ, it's time for this particular 276'er (<< see, I didn't say 00115'er) to head back east. I know we all say it at one time or another, but if you get the chance to be a Career Manager or Occupation Manager in this fine city, jump at it! I've done both jobs while here, and can think of no other positions that can be so frustrating, yet so absolutely satisfying when the yardsticks move forward.

With that, I'll introduce CPO1 Joe Guerin, a west-coast NCIOP, who will be taking these reigns in early September '05. I've known Chief Guerin for a few years now and can attest that he is certainly up to the task of managing the occupation and moving it forward. Besides, I'm sure he'll be getting a few unsolicited phone calls from a certain CPO1 along the way J (hmmm...wonder who that will be Joe?) Ensure you give him the support he requires to do well on your behalf.

Everyone take care. I'm sure I'll see the west coasters again, and those in Halifax at the Mess Dinner. For those on CHARLOTTETOWN, see you in August.

CFEWC Unit CPO

Hello from Building 91 in the Defence Research Campus, located in Shirley's Bay- just east of Kanata, ON. We fall under the umbrella of ADM IM, and subsequently CFIOG. All CF 3 elements work under one roof. It will serve you well to know exactly what to expect at this unit and all of the implications that your employment will have on your career. Within the unit, the NESOPs are well diversified and have been embedded into a variety of sections at CFEWC. And it should come at no surprise that we fall under the "Operations" Dept. Currently we are in 4 different sections at this unit. Here is some insight into each:

EWOS

The scope of the EW Operational Support cell can be broken down into 2 areas - Theatre support and Unit support. Theatre support entails the provision of SIGINT and OPELINT data to the Tactical Airlift Unit EW Detachment (TAU EW Det) deployed in Camp Mirage. In addition to the data, we also train and deploy personnel to TAU EW Det. On the Unit support level we provide OPELINT data to the various sections (predominantly Non Parametrics) for the population of the CFEWB, and we publish historical OPELINT reports on our TITAN/MCOIN website. We also tackle RFI's that come our way. It is an integrated cell that employs NESOPS, COMM RESEARCH and AESOPS. Upon being posted to CFEWC/EWOS, you will be challenging the following courses: MATH 1030, SIGE 2810(EA 279), Operational Signal Intelligence (OSA) and BEW. I highly recommend that your clearance be TSSA upon arrival at CFEWC or else you will be relegated to the "waiting room".

OP ATHENA

CFEWC provides one analyst to the TAU EW Det on each rotation of OP ATHENA. On several occasions NESOPs employed at CFEWC have had the opportunity to deploy to Camp Mirage (CM), "somewhere" in the Southwest Asia Theatre of Operations, to fill this role.

I, MS Brian MacMillan, will be employed as an OpELINT Support Analyst, briefing CC-130 aircrews prior to every flight. I will be working alongside MCpl Wilson Billard, a Comm Research (291) from CF SIGINT Operations Centre (CFSOC) Leitrim.

While most of the pre-deployment training and DAG process is the same as NESOPs normally endure before deploying as a crewmember of an HMC Ship, there are some added features when deploying to a land-based position. There is a Peace Support Operations (PSO) course taught in Kingston at the Peace Support Training Centre (PSTC) and several Wing Readiness Training Flights across the country. I attended a week long PSO course at 14 Wing, Greenwood, N.S. The course includes lectures and briefings about Powers of Attorney, financial benefits, preventative medicine, foreign weapons, mine awareness and many other topics. Lots of good information, if you can survive five days of PowerPoint.

Another prerequisite for this particular deployment billet is the Operational SIGINT Analyst (OSA) course taught by the Comm Research instructors of CF School of Communications and Electronics (CFSCE) in Kingston, Ontario. Nine weeks on an army base. Need I say more? We learned enough about Unix to make us dangerous and enough about GALE-Lite to do the job. An excellent course, albeit with many issues which require resolving.

On the job training in the EW Operational Support (EWOS) cell at CFEWC will be capped off with a week at CFSOC Leitrim learning about TRS and P3S, then it's a couple weeks of leave and I'm on an Airbus to the desert.

Non Parametrics Cell

The purpose of this article is to give you a general overview of the Non-Parametric (NP Cell) and their duties within CFEWC. The NP Cell consists of the NP Production Supervisor (PO1/WO), two NP Analyst Supervisor (PO2/SGT) and eight Analysts (4 civilians and 4 MCpl/Cpl). The following Trades may fill those positions: NESOP, AESOP and COMM/RESCH.

The NP Cell's primary responsibility is to populate the CFEWDB (Canadian Forces Electronic Warfare Database) with the Orders of Battle for all countries. This includes the identification, specifications and locations for all military, paramilitary and military employed equipment that can pose a potential threat to our Naval, Airborne and Land assets.

It is Non-Parametric's job to provide the information in the CFEWDB as to Who, Where and Why emitters are being used. Our duties include the collection, correlation, analysis and reporting of all information relating to Electronic Warfare other than the parametric data of radar and non-communication emitters.

In addition to populating and maintaining the CFEWDB, the NP Cell provided support to clients in form of RFIs (Request For Information). This may be as simple as confirmation of an aircraft variant in a given country, or as involved as identifying all Anti-Ship threats in a given area.

Quality Assurance Cell

The CFEWC Quality Assurance (QA) section is divided into three cells: Parametric QA, Non-Parametric QA and Joint ELINT Analysis (JEA) QA. Each of these cells is related to a section of Operations within CFEWC and consists of an Sgt/PO2 supervisor, at least one civilian worker, all who are supervised by a PO1/WO.

As a QA Analyst, a NESOP will be expected to verify parametric, non-parametric or ELINT information that will be entered into the CFEWDB, or into Canadian ELINT Technical (CELT) reports that will be released to the Communications Security Establishment (CSE). The purpose of this effort is to ensure that the reports are accurate and that they meet the criteria set out in the CFEWDB SOPs. Additionally, the QA Analysts will advise the supervisors of the Para and Non-Para sections, the QA supervisor and the Database Manager with regards to any problems, changes or future improvements to their procedures or the CFEWDB.

While there is not an official billet for a NESOP in the QA Cell per se, any NESOP employed at CFEWC has the chance to be engaged as a QA analyst, after a stint in one of the other related cells within CFEWC. Employment in the QA cell may mean the requirement for additional courses above those required for parametric and non-parametric analysis. Additional courses may include: SIGE 3810 Intermediate TechELINT, SIGE 4810 Advanced TechELINT for Para QA analysts and MIDB and SPARTAN for the NP QA analysts as well as many advanced Microsoft courses such as Excel, Access, Word and Powerpoint, at the discretion of the QA Supr and the Ops Training Officer. Additionally, the QA analyst may be required to attend seminars or conferences in Canada, USA or UK, which relate to EW production, or any of the other Databases used by CFEWC.

A little background on what we do here at Above Water Battlespace (AWB). The AWB section is responsible for planning, conducting, analyzing and reporting of OT&E of naval Anti-Air & Surface, Electronic Warfare systems and platforms. AWB is staffed by both military and civilian specialists, and works in close cooperation with the Tactics section of the CFMWC, as well as with other military and civilian organizations. OT&E at AWB is normally associated with the introduction or modification of a specific AAW, ASUW & EW system and focuses on assessing the operational effectiveness and suitability of that equipment for maritime service. OPTESTs are comprehensive evaluations of system's capability against current or emerging threats in AAW and ASUW.

2005 is turning out to be a very busy year for AWB. Spring of '05 sees us conducting operational tests with WIN's Missilex and ATH, STJ and HAL's Missilex during CFO1/05. AWB continues to be involved with a wide range of projects including: Harpoon, SM-2, NSSM, ESSM, 76mm, 57mm including 3P Ammo, CIWS 1B, Sirius, Nulka, Sea Search, SRD-504, Canews, Ramses, 40mm Bofors, Remote Controlled Heavy Machine Gun (RCHMG), Chaff / IR Trials at Nestra and FIAC Optests.

If anyone were to ask, I would tell them this is the best shore position for a PO1 NESOP in the Navy. AWB allows you to stay current in the trade and also be at the leading edge of new technology coming into the Navy. Your input here at the CFMWC can shape our future and what direction we need to go. A reminder to all that the CFMWC is not the sole source of the "good ideas club" and that if you want something tested, send something my way.
